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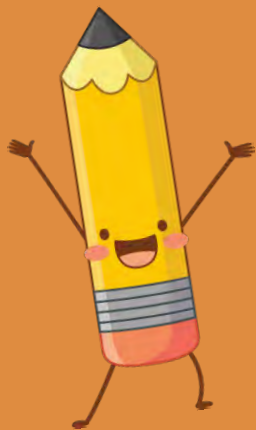

The Role of a Clinical Audiologist

Diagnoses and treats hearing and balance disorders in patients of all ages.

- Hearing Assessments: Conduct comprehensive hearing tests.
- Device Fitting: Recommend, fit, and adjust various different types of devices.
- Counseling: Provide counseling about hearing loss and treatment options.
- Ear Health: Manage and treat ear-related conditions.
- Collaboration: Coordinate care with other healthcare providers.

The Role of an Educational Audiologist

Supports students with hearing loss within school settings.

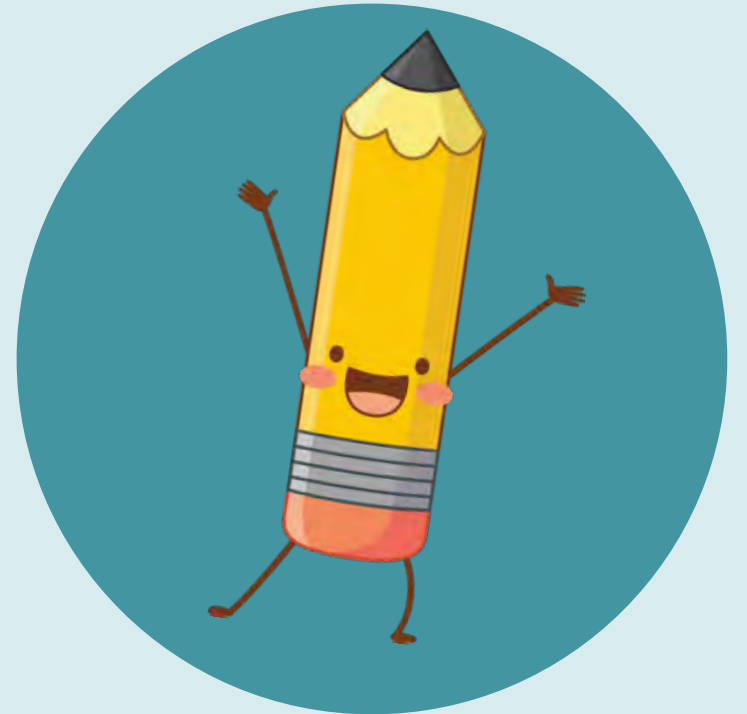
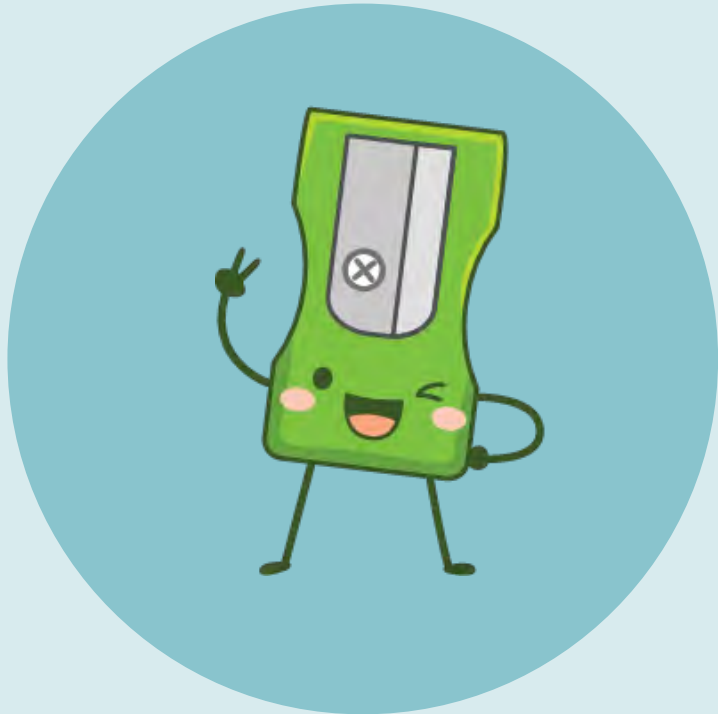
- Assessments and Evaluations: Conduct hearing screenings and assessments.
- IEPs: Develop and implement Individualized Education Plans.
- Classroom Accommodations: Recommend and oversee assistive technologies.
- Teacher Training: Educate teachers on supporting students with hearing loss.
- Family Support: Provide resources and support to families.
- Collaboration: Work with school personnel to ensure comprehensive support.

The Role of the Teacher of the Deaf

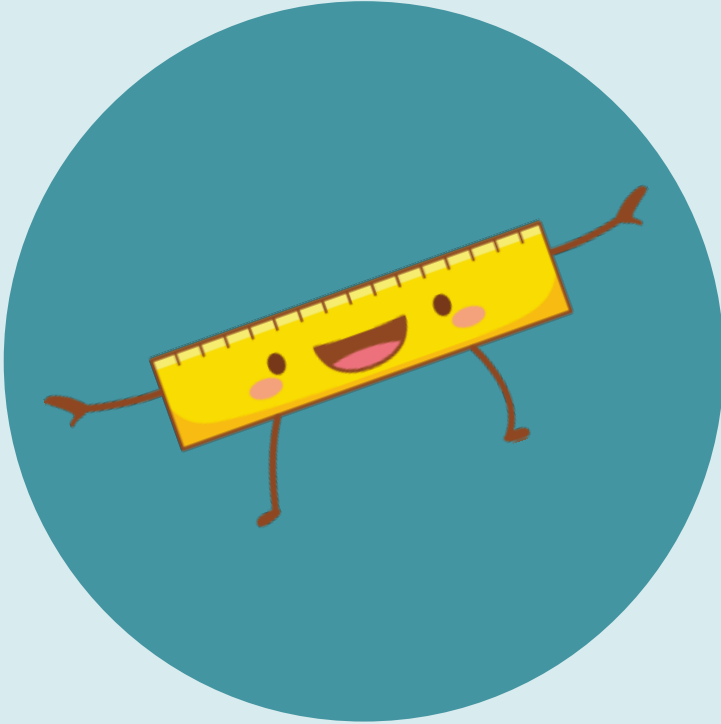
Specialize in educating students who are deaf or hard of hearing.

- Direct Instruction: Provides individualized or small group instruction.
- Curriculum Development: Adapts and develops curriculum materials.
- Language and Communication: Focus on language development, including ASL.
- Classroom Support: Assist in implementing accommodations and modifications.
- Advocacy: Advocate for students' needs within the school system.
- Family Engagement: Work closely with families to support educational and social development.

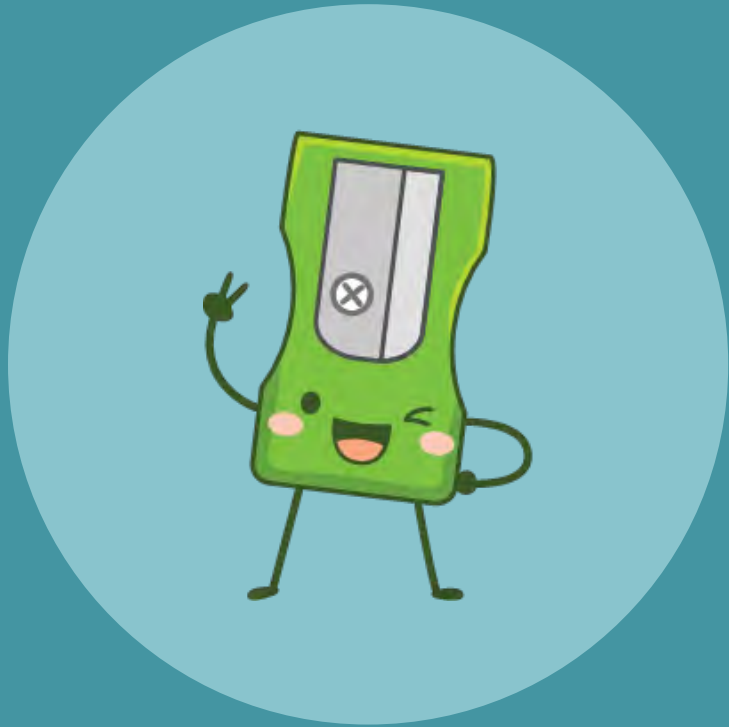
